

Director's Message:

FY2014 brought the challenge of overcrowding and opportunities to open additional beds within the agency. It was also a year marked by success and outreach in service areas. ADC hit a record high for overall population on February 21, 2014. The county jail backup climbed to 2,884 on February 28, 2014. ADC received appropriation and funding during the Fiscal Session to open 200 additional beds at the North Central Unit, as well as support for continued operation of those beds. During the June 30, 2014, fiscal session the agency received support to open more than 600 beds, including 100 at the McPherson Unit, 72 at Ouachita River Correctional Unit, 124 at the old training academy at Tucker (which will be utilized as a boot camp), 58 at the Northwest Arkansas Work Release Center and temporary beds were opened in a facility owned by Pulaski County. Renovations began on the old Diagnostic Unit and the Board of Corrections approved naming the facility in honor of Cpl. Barbara Ester who was killed in the line of duty. That facility will provide more than 300 additional beds (in phase I and II) when it reopens in late 2015. Plans began to seek funding and support of a new 1,000-bed prison. Bark at Dark, a fundraiser for Paws in Prison, was held September 10 and raised \$25,000. The annual horse auction netted \$28,662 for the Agriculture Division. Thirty-three horses, colts and mules were sold at an average price of \$868. The Northwest Arkansas Work Release Center moved to its new location at 600 West Sunset Avenue, after the old armory building was renovated, which provided space for 100 inmates. The Willis H. Sargent Training Academy moved from Tucker to the old England school, which was renovated and repurposed to provide more space and a gym for ADC cadets and staff.

As Director, I am proud of ADC's employees and their accomplishments over the past year. We look forward to new opportunities in service to this great state. On behalf of this agency, I extend a collective thank you for the support ADC has received from the Governor, the General Assembly and the Board of Corrections.

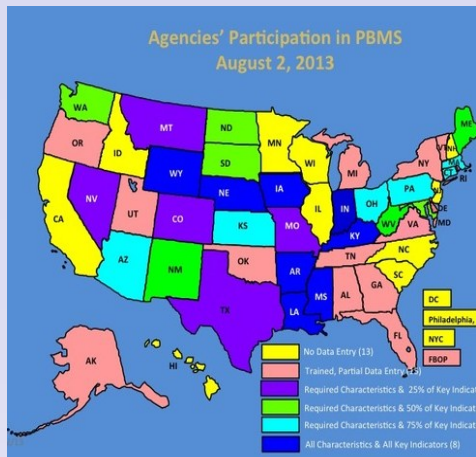

Arkansas has gone BLUE for PBMS




The Arkansas Department of Correction achieved blue status on the PBMS (Performance Based Measure System) map as defined by the Association of State Correctional Administrators (ASCA). PBMS is a nationwide automated mechanism that was designed to develop consistent and meaningful correctional performance measures for adult prisons and community-based

programs and an automated system that would enable the collection, management and sharing of data. ADC achieved all characteristics and key indicators for PBMS. With this information, the ADC can track performance on important operational, program and service measures and compare the findings to other states' corrections agencies. ASCA thanked Director Ray Hobbs for his commitment to achieving BLUE status.

ADC's Gleaning Program Garner's National Attention

ADC assisted the Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance in gleaning fields for produce donated by state farmers. The organization rescued 1.2 million pounds of produce from fields, and ADC was responsible for 80 percent of the produce gleaned. Arkansas growers gained national attention when Major James Hill attended the Feeding America Conference in Chicago, Ill., to deliver a presentation on the ADC gleaning program. The first in the nation to have this program, ADC served as a model at the conference.



Seized Contraband becomes Lifeline

The ADC turned contraband into something positive when Internal Affairs Investigator Mike Brockman found the organization, “Cell Phones for Soldiers” and made arrangements to donate more than 1,500 phones to the non-profit organization. Proceeds from the recycled phones buy pre-paid calling cards for servicemen and women stationed around the world. The ADC is happy to have the opportunity



to turn contraband into something positive. ADC's efforts in this program have been the subject of statewide and national media attention.

ADC aids City of Pine Bluff in installation of Bus Stops



Pine Bluff Transit purchased four bus stop enclosures and five custom benches for bus stops around the city. These benches and covers were built and installed by Arkansas Correctional Industries Inmates (ACI).

Offender's Choice & Tea-Riffic

Packaging coffee and tea is part of the daily grind at the Grimes Unit. Arkansas Correctional Industries grinds coffee and packages and sells both coffee and tea. Coffee is sold as in whole bean or ground varieties. Both coffee and tea are available for purchase and are on display in the lobby of the Administration East Building on Harding Avenue.



ADC receives Rebates for Energy Savings

Its conservation efforts are resulting in annual savings of \$750,000 for ADC. State agencies were required to develop a program to manage energy, water and other utility uses to reduce total energy consumption per gross square foot for all existing buildings by 20 percent by 2014 and by 30 percent by 2017 based on energy consumption for the 2007-2008 fiscal year. ADC has met the objectives of Act 1494 of the 87th General Assembly by reducing energy consumption in agency facilities by 20 percent.

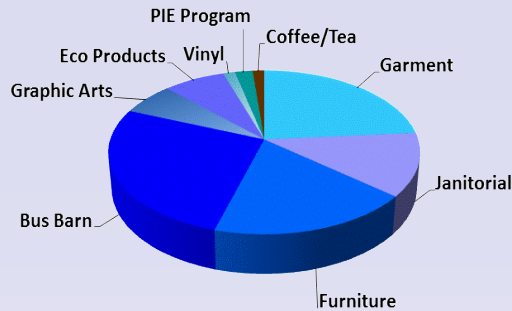
