Pay plans that went into effect last year will remain the same and all state agencies and their employees will be affected.

In a memorandum issued May 26 from Finance and Administration Director Richard Weiss, the 2.3% COLA scheduled to go into effect July 1 will not be applied to employees' salaries.



And even though merit increases are not possible right now because state revenues are still down, personnel evaluations still will be conducted on all employees this Fiscal Year.

But if the economy has improved after the first two quarters of FY 2011, all of these decisions will be revisited, according to the memo from Mr. Weiss.

Bass Fingerlings Harvested at Cummins Ponds



Employees of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commision along with the Arkansas Bass Association came to the breeding ponds at the Cummins Unit on
June 24 to harvest BlackWard Gardner of the
Arkansas Bass Associa-
tion said that minnows

Since 2001, Cummins and Arkansas Game and Fish have raised more than 100,000 bass fingerlings a year in the unit's ponds.

The fish, which average three inches in length, will grow to 10-13 inches in as little as three to four years, ensuring a consistent level of both Black and Large Mouth Bass for years to come. Ward Gardner of the Arkansas Bass Association said that minnows for feeding the brood fish are provided annually by the ABA, in addition to funding for diesel fuel for the pond aerators.

Using a seine net, the fish are gathered and extracted by hand into holding tanks where they are later bagged and distributed to fishing tournament anglers who release them into the river.

Mr. Bill's Beans Bill Watson

INGREDIENTS

- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 package HOT pork sausage, browned & drained 1 package pre-cooked bacon, chopped

- 1 can Lima Beans
- 1 can Light Kidney Beans 2 cans Pork and Beans
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup light brown s 1/2 cup ketchup
- 1/2 cup ketchup 1/4 cup seellesse merete
- 1/4 cup yellow mustard 1 tspn salt
- 2 tspns black pepper

After browning and draining sausage, add chopped onion and bacon then cook until onions become tender. Add all 3 cans of beans and stir. Add brown sugar, salt and pepper and stir to prevent lumps. Add ketchup and mustard then stir occasionally on low for 15-20 minutes to prevent beans from burning.



Health Matters

Keeping The Beat - Stress Management vs. High Blood Pressure

High Blood Pressure ranks as one of the leading causes of stroke and heart attack in many Americans today. Known as "The Silent Killer", it can strike anyone at anytime without showing any visible symptoms until it's too late.

While certain tell-tale signs are noticeable, such as shortness of breath, frequent nosebleeds and occasional pains in the chest and arm, many men and women haven't a clue as to their blood pressure.

The factors in elevated pressures include age, weight, work related stress and lack of regular exercise. Some families pass on a history of heart-related problems and life-



styles certainly can lead to a weakened physical condition.

While the problems linked to **High Blood Pressure** can be quite serious, there are simple and easy to follow steps to reduce or even eliminate the problem from your life. **Regular Doctor Visits**– make a habit of regular check-ups to help detect if you're having a problem and develop a program that works best for you. If medicines are prescribed, take them as directed.

Watch That Diet-cut down on high fat and high cholesterol foods and condiments. Eat fruits, vegetables and grains. Go easy on the salt and extra sugars and try to limit your alcohol intake as well.

Get Out and Exercise- you don't have to enter the Olympics or anything. Slow walking and light jogging can help your lungs and heart. But check with your doctor before beginning an exercise plan.

But one doesn't simply "drop by" a blood drive. After walking in, I

began noticing all of the smiles being cast my way. Yours truly was being sized up as a potential donor as I nervously grinned back....

Now I have been giving blood since I was in high school, so I know the routine isn't as scary as some might think. But if you've never donated before, here's the scoop:

Sample first– a small pin prick on the finger for a drop to determine your blood's type and how healthy it is.

Table manners– you're taken to a table-bed to relax as they prepare you for your donation. Then the needle.

One big stick- and then you're on

track to becoming a hero to someone in need of your precious gift and having the right to say, "I gave blood today!" According to the **Red Cross**, the demand for blood rises during the busy summer vacation months and for every pint of blood donated, six lives will be saved.

The event, which took place at Administration East on June 29th, attracted more than 20 ADC volunteers who unselfishly gave of their time and effort to donate blood. A big thanks to all of our donors as well as to the Arkansas Red Cross.

In a recent move to better utilize bed space, the **Tucker Unit** became the new home of the male **Boot Camp** program. It switched places with the **Inner-Change Freedom Initiative** program, which is now located at the **Wrightsville Unit**.

While the transition went smoothly, certain pieces of office equipment had to be left behind. Copiers, fax machines and computers will have to be moved later, but there are more pluses than minuses according to the staff and instructors in charge.

The newer facility houses approximately 160 cadets and comes with a gym, recreation center and baseball field where staff and cadets hope to play an exhibition game with an outside team in the near future.

The Boot Camp program, which is in its 20th year, continues to draw the attention and respect of the state local community with its unique approach to inmate rehabilitation. High schools students, judges and state legislators tour on a regular basis, and all are impressed by the results of this 105-day, volunteer program. Two of its **DI's**, or drill instructors, are both former military with more than 50 years combined military service and an additional 40 years with the ADC. Sgt. James Thomas and Sgt. Laurel Hooks are proud to be making a difference in the lives of the inmate cadets through hard work and discipline.

All Drill Instructors for the Boot Camp must be former military who were honorably discharged and completed 40 hours of departmental certification with strong emphasis on the drilling, training and instructing of prison inmates. Their methods of **"Shock-Incarceration"** introduce all inmates to the strict and challenging world of military discipline.

A zero-tolerance policy against defiant or disrespectful behavior is strictly adhered to or the cadet faces return to the general population. Self respect and a mutual respect for others along with education and counseling are applied daily until completion of the program.

Graduations are held every three weeks, which coincides with the cadets' parole dates. All graduates then enter an after-care program, working with family members, clergy and other members of the community to better ensure the reacclimation to society.

The Boot Camp instructors and staff feel this to be more than just another program; it's an opportunity for inmates to better themselves.



Sweats/Shorts/Warm-ups-will be considered appropriate only in classes containing physical activities -not during normal In-Service classes.

Smoking is not allowed on Academy property.

Please observe break times and lunch periods.

Cell phones or pagers need to be on vibrate or silent while in the classroom.

Students arriving more than 15 minutes late for the starting time of a class, or more than 15 minutes late from a break/lunch will be dismissed from the class.
