OSHA Leadership and Fall Prevention Seminar



Dunsmoor (a former convicted felon) from Red Rocks Community College in Lakewood, Colorado. Not only does he have a doctorate degree but travels all over the U.S. and other countries to facilitate OSHA training to many different industries. He also has a single-engine pilot's license. He is truly an inspiration to all of us behind bars that we can advance beyond the limits of our criminal offenses regardless of the naysayers. The one-day event covered topics regarding safety awareness on the job, social style skills, and job opportunities in the construction and oil and gas industry. All those attending will receive OSHA certified certificates on this subject and this training can be a valuable resource in your job search process.
