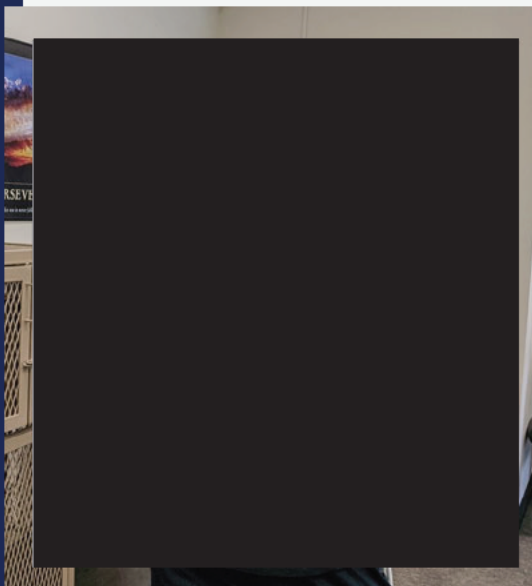
# From the Director

In recognition of his quick response in saving a Conway man's life with Naloxone in March, Agent Bryan Padgett (Area 6, shown at right) was presented with a Naloxone Life Saving Award. The award is made possible by the Arkansas Criminal Justice Institute, the Office of the Drug Director, and the Arkansas Board of Pharmacy. Padgett came to the offender's aid when the offender was brought to the Parole Office by his girlfriend. She entered the PPO office and inquired about Narcan for the offender who was outside in the car incoherently mumbling. Padgett, along with several officers went to the vehicle, assessed the situation and Padgett performed sternum rubs while simultaneously applying Narcan to the offender's left nostril. After a few brief moments, he went from incoherently mumbling and nodding off to being aware of his name, age and whereabouts. Shortly after, the paramedics and Conway Police Department arrived on scene. Due to quick thinking and action taken by Agent Bryan Padgett, the offender survived his crisis.



Offender [REDACTED], shown below, has been in and out of the criminal justice system for more than 40 years, At the end of May he was presented with his parole discharge paperwork and a certificate of parole

supervision completion by his Parole Agent Ashley Stuart (his supervising officer) and Area 4 Area Manager Ryan Burton. It was fitting that the poster in the background of this celebratory photo



displayed the word "perseverance" as [REDACTED] has been the definition of the word for nearly 10 years. [REDACTED] was last released from the Arkansas Department of Corrections to parole supervision in Jonesboro in November 2010 and he was determined to never go back again. In the years following his release, [REDACTED] became a fixture at the Jonesboro Parole Office and started participating in various programs such as a substance abuse program, a program offered by the local HUD Office called Family Self Sufficiency and a return to education program offered through ASU-Newport. He even started volunteering at the Craighead County Public Library. With the assistance of these programs and various others offered through places such as Arkansas Rehabilitation Services and the VA Clinic, [REDACTED] learned to set goals that helped him maintain his sobriety, get his own apartment, obtain a valid driver's license, get his own vehicle, obtain employment, obtain medical/medication management assistance and to further his education. [REDACTED] became homeless at one point early on during his parole supervision and to ensure he did not mess up and fall back into his old ways, instead of house hopping with family and friends, he began sleeping on the benches at the local court house and inside of the local police department. He explained that he knew that those were safe places where he could not get into any trouble. [REDACTED] continued to attend his various appointments, programs and

classes until he was in a position to be able to get an apartment of his own and start making progress in his life. Several years ago, the local newspaper ran a story on ██████ success and he was excited to share that there is hope for felons in the world of employment, education and housing, but made it clear that you have to want it and you have to work for it every single day. Oddly enough, shortly after that story was published, ██████ got a job at that very newspaper. Today, he still works at the newspaper and he still resides in the apartment he was able to obtain through the HUD Family Self-Sufficiency Program more than seven years ago. ██████ said he has future plans of reaching out to other inmates to become a mentor now that he is no longer on parole. ██████ was congratulated for his achievements, and Area 4 wishes him all the best in his future endeavors!

Area 5 has adopted a unique way to see offenders and deal with COVID-19 while trying to keep some normalcy to their daily routine. The area created office visit stations that allow officers to meet face-to-face with offenders while minimizing risk of exposure to the virus. The stations use the windows in the office to separate officers and offenders allowing for a meeting through the barrier. The office has six stations available. Shown above is Officer Jerrica Dutton awaiting her next offender to come up to the window to conduct an office visit. Offenders are kept outside the building unless there is an issue or a problem that needs addressed.

The WellPath medical personnel at the center play a major part in the constant operations by consistently and carefully monitoring the intakes due to the COVID-19 pandemic while continuing to manage current residents progress and health. Teresa Dow, Site Coordinator for Shorter College is doing an awesome job with college students at the South-west Center. There were 85 residents who completed the Spring Semester 2020, and there are 77 residents enrolled for Summer 1.

Area 1 Agent Kevin Watson donated his time and energy to build a gift (the flag sign the student is holding in the photograph below) to assist Benton County



Deputy Sheriff Blaine Miller in “adopting” a high school senior. 5 News Online out of Fayetteville reports Miller adopted Casey Ward, a Gentry High School senior who wants to be a police officer. Men and women

in law enforcement came together and provided gifts to Casey for his special day and conducted a lights and sirens drive by. Benton County Sheriff’s Office shared the news on their Facebook page and wrote, “Congrats Casey. We wish you a bright future and hope to see you have a long successful career in law enforcement one day.” Members of the Benton County Sheriff’s Office, Gentry Police Department, and Benton County Parole and Probation donated time and gifts to Casey.

The Harrison Office (Area 2) adopted two local nurses for Nurse Appreciation Week, prepared baskets containing their favorite snacks and presented the baskets shown at right to each nurse.



Area 2 Agent Steve Simers assisted the Fulton County Sheriff’s Office in the investigation of a Salem shooting by conducting a home visit at the residence of the suspect, who is an active parolee. Officers were given access to the residence by an occupant and discovered several drug related items

and a loaded handgun. On another day, Simers assisted the sheriff’s office in an investigation of a suspicious vehicle and again discovered drugs. During the search, a vehicle driven by an active parolee approached the scene. Simers directed him to stop, but he fled at a high rate of speed. Later a backpack was found, which had been discarded by the offender, containing the components of a methamphetamine lab.



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Residents at the Northeast Center in Osceola took part in a chalk challenge, titled Five Stages of Change, in the recreation yard. Each pod picked individuals to draw their murals. Pod 7 was chosen as the best by three staff members.



Area 8 is tentatively scheduled to move into ACC's new building in North Little Rock in early July.

Area 10 Agents Kerri McBroom and Randy Zimmerman, along with the Sheridan Police Department, followed a tip about weapons violations and discovered firearms, a machete, drugs and alcohol at the home of two offenders. Items found included a Charter Arms 6 shot .38 cal revolver fully loaded with six rounds of live ammunition, one 22-250 Winchester round, seven .40 cal pistol rounds, a "blunt" of marijuana, a Marlin Model 917V .17cal scoped rifle, with a loaded clip, twelve .17cal rounds, a machete and a bottle of Quality House vodka.

Area 10 Assistant Area Manager Joe Kuhn and Agent Zimmerman conducted firearms requalification training for Area 10 Parole/Probation Officers and staff from OMEGA Unit at the Ouachita River Unit firing range.

### **Treatment Program Summary:**

1,056 probationers and parolees were served in the general Substance Use Disorder Treatment Programs. Additionally 1,419 participants were served in the Drug Court Treatment Programs, bringing the total served to 2,475.

A total of 452 residents have agreed to participate in Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) since the program started in July 2018; 159 are discharged with follow up in progress in the community; and 24 have completed the program. Partnerships are in effect with 56 community providers to continue MAT upon release from an ACC center.

Telehealth services began July 2019 and are currently active in 14 locations.

### **Reentry Facilities:**

As of May 30, ACC has seven licensed reentry facilities with 251 residents currently in Phases I-IV of the Reentry Facility Program. There were 31 reentry graduates during May and 38 new residents transferred into the program with one resident starting GED classes, nine residents receiving their GED, and three residents receiving their Career Readiness Certificate. Ten reentry facility residents acquired a driver's license, 29 received an ID card, 15 received their Social Security card and 12 acquired birth certificates.

### **Reentry Officers:**

Reentry Officers conducted 244 reentry facility office visits, 87 Phase IV office visits, 24 Phase IV home visits, and 64 Pre-Parole Plan Verifications. Reentry Officers also made 39 community contacts within their assigned area during the month.

### **Transitional Housing:**

During May there were 20 licensed facilities with 518 ACC-funded residents in the facilities. Within the transitional facilities there are a total of 227 residents who have obtained full time employment. During May, one resident reported to have enrolled in GED classes, two residents reported to have completed GED and two residents completed WAGE. There are 52 registered sex offenders living in transitional facilities. A total of 17 residents received their driver's license, 82 received an ID card, 46 received their social security card and 19 received birth certificates. A total of 65 graduated the transitional housing program.

### **Volunteer Program:**

Ten volunteers provided 581 volunteer hours (faith-based, mentors, interns, treatment and education) during May.

### **The Good Grid:**

There are approximately 747 service providers registered in Good Grid, a total of 67,216 supervision accounts, and 12,602 inmate registered accounts. There are currently 2,161 visible resumes. This month, 83 new inmates and 438 new supervision accounts were registered on The Good Grid.

### **Arkansas Works:**

During the month there were approximately 343 individuals who were screened for the Arkansas Works program. There were a total 646 individuals who submitted an application and 806 who enrolled in a qualified health plan as reported by the Eaton Agency.

### **Harbor House:**

Currently, there are 13 recovery coaches trained to work with offenders and 222 ACC clients connected to a recovery coach. There are currently seven recovery coaches embedded in various ACC locations including Sebastian, Crittenden, Crawford, Jefferson, Franklin, Logan and Scott counties.

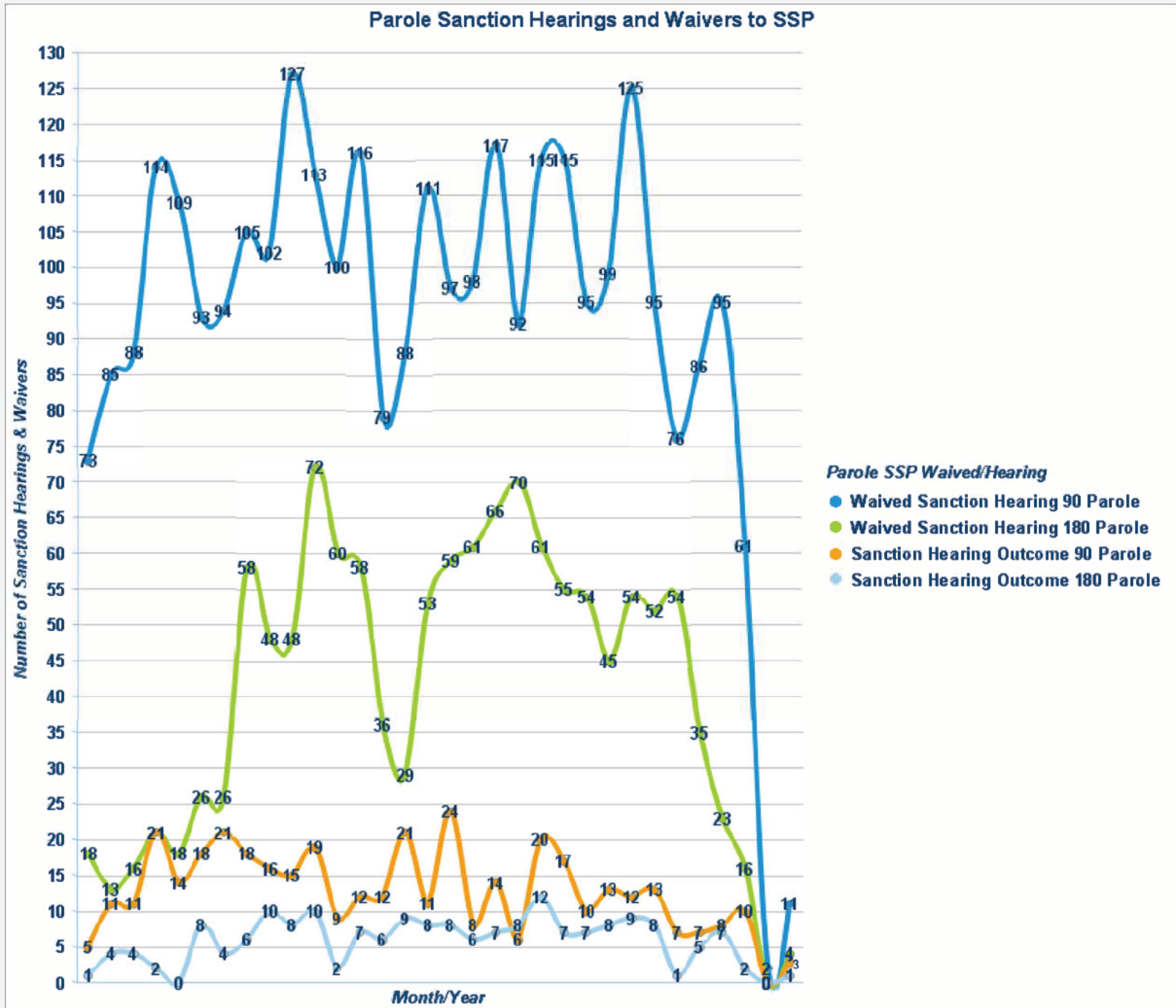
