A Mountain Home offender celebrated with Area 2 staff as she graduated from Drug Court in late April. The woman, who completed the program without any strikes or sanctions for infractions, didn't begin her journey through the court system in compliance. In July 2017, she was sentenced to 72 months of supervised probation in Boone County Circuit Court for charges of Forgery and Theft of Property - but did not follow the conditions of her probation and her supervision was revoked in November 2018. She was then ordered to complete the Drug Court program in Mountain Home. In Drug Court, she began to change her life around, which included finding a full-time job.

ta donated resource boxes to give female offenders newly released from prison or a correction center in **Area 8**. Area 8 Intensive Parole Supervision team was able to obtain intelligence information that an offender was potentially involved in narcotics activities. A home visit was conducted and the following items were found and confiscated by Little Rock Police: one-half pound of marijuana, 1 ounce of powder cocaine, and approximately \$17,000 in US currency. The offender was transported to the detective division for questioning and will be charged. A violation report will be completed.

An Easter Dinner was held for residents at the **Central Arkansas Center** in Little Rock. The event was hosted by Jonesboro men's fellowship "REAL Men, REAL Life, REAL God Ministries." Volunteers came to serve the food and chat with the residents. Residents were served roast beef, mashed potatoes, corn, green beans, a large cookie and choice of tea or water.



Area 1 Parole/Probation Officer Matt Jenkins along with Benton County Narcotics officers arrested an offender and found 9 pounds of marijuana, \$49,000 in cash and 11 guns (see below).



The Work of Parole/Probation Officers and Agents

Area 2 Officer Hunter Boles and Agent Josh Morehead, assisted by officers of the Izard County Sheriff's Department and the 16th Judicial District Drug Task Force, conducted home compliance checks finding drug paraphernalia and marijuana in one home and at another home they discovered a sex offender in residence who had not registered the house as his residence. Drug paraphernalia also was found in the home. At another home, Officer Boles and Agent Morehead, assisted by officers of the Izard County Sheriff's Department, found drug paraphernalia (see below) and what appeared to marijuana growing in pots.



Area 2 Agent Steve Simers conducted a home visit in rural Fulton County along with a Fulton County deputy and discovered the offender he sought was not living



in the trailer he normally lives in. They also found another offender living in an adjacent trailer without permission from her officer to do so and they found drugs and drug paraphernalia including 33 Xanax bars, 7 capsules with the number G-456 which was identified as amphetamine and Dextroamphetamine Extended Release, 30 mg and is a schedule 2 controlled substance and two other blue pills. The offender was transported to the Fulton Co Jail where felony charges are pending.

Area 2 Agents Cody Cassell and Jimmy Carter conducted a home visit on a probationer in Marshall and found methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia. The Searcy County Sheriff's Department was called, and the suspected drugs and paraphernalia turned over to them. New charges will be filed in Searcy County Circuit Court. On a second home visit in Marshall officers found evidence that an offender was using drugs. Charges will be filed in Searcy County Circuit Court. A third home visit in Marshall revealed methamphetamine in an offender's home and charges are pending in this case as well.

Area 11 Agents Dustin Parker and Brooke Williams conducted a home visit in Rison and discovered a marijuana grinder, Fuzion digital scales, numerous syringes along with 2 plastic baggies with white powdery residue suspected to be methamphetamine, a box of lock picking tools, metal police baton, a compound bow, a machete, a sawed off .410 shotgun with pistol grip, a .380 S.P.P. automatic handgun and a United States Army restricted counter terrorism elite unit tactical manual. The offender was booked into the Cleveland County Jail for committing the offenses of



Felony Possession of a Firearm, Felony Possession of a Defaced Firearm, Felony Possession of a Prohibited Weapon and Felony Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

Area 11 Agents Parker and Williams also conducted a home visit in White Hall and found the offender had brass knuckles in his pockets along with methamphetamine. Drug paraphernalia also was found. The offender was charged with committing the offenses of Felony Possession of Methamphetamine and Felony Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. A probation violation report will be submitted



Area 6 Officer Heike McKinney coordinated a compliance check at the Phoenix Recovery Center in Conway along with 12 parole/probation officers, Reentry Assistant Area Manager Jarod Self, Reentry Officer Daniel Potter, 7 Conway Police Department officers and 7 Faulkner County deputies. Approximately 25 offenders were on campus, no issues were found during the body searches and no serious violations were found. The cooperation between the departments was remarkable.

Area 10 Parole/Probation Officers Justin Stewart and David Sanford along with investigators for Garland County conducted a home visit on a level 3 sex offender and found several items that were disturbing such as 2 laptops, 3 cell phones and an iPad. A cursory search of the devices found high risk behavior of sites such as dating sites, Craigslist rooms availability, gay thug dating site, sex store purchases from extreme restraints.com and several social media accounts and email accounts. They also found paperwork with other people's IDs and Social Security cards were found. Pandemic

relief claims were made in these individuals names and were addressed back to the offender's address. The investigation was turned over to the Garland County Sheriff's Office and the Attorney General's Office.

Area 10 Parole/Probation Agent Vanessa Townsend, Officers Richard Perry, Cameron Rhinehart, and Eva Jensen and Saline County Sheriff Deputies conducted a search of the home of two offenders due to reports of drugs being used at and other felons frequenting the home. A search yielded a .25 caliber pistol and 30 grams of methamphetamine. An offender living in the home was transported to Saline County Detention Center and charged with Simultaneous Possession of Drugs and Firearms, Possession of Firearms by Certain Persons, Possession of Meth with Purpose to Deliver, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Possession of Sched. IV, with Purpose to Deliver x2. An active probationer was located at the residence and sanctioned accordingly for his new violations. An active parole absconder was found and taken into custody and transported to Saline County Detention Center.

Area 8 Intensive Parole Supervision Agents received a phone call from Little Rock Police Department in reference to a traffic stop made on an offender with officers requesting help for a home visit due to the large amount of cash found on the offender. IPS Agents went to the home and found a small amount of black tar heroin and xanax pills. The scene and evidence was turned over to LRPD who found 157 grams of Fentanyl. The offender will be charged and a petition to revoke filed.

In late April, some of the **Area 10** employees received their second Covid-19 vaccinations.

Treatment Program Summary:

824 probationers and parolees were served in the general Substance Use Disorder Treatment Programs. Additionally 970 participants were served in Drug Court Treatment programs, bringing the total served to 1,794.

A total of 500 residents have agreed to participate in Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) since the program started in July 2018; 235 are discharged with

follow up in progress in the community; and 62 have completed the program. Partnership is in effect with 62 Community Providers to continue MAT upon release from the Centers.

Reentry Facilities:

As of April 30, 2021, ACC has 7 licensed reentry facilities with 207 total residents currently in Phases I-IV of the Reentry Facility Program. There were 35 reentry graduates during April.

Also during April, 13 new residents were transferred into the reentry program, 5 residents started WAGE classes, 1 resident completed WAGE, 21 residents started Career Readiness Certification (CRC) programs, 17 residents completed CRC and one resident started GED classes. A total of 18 reentry facility residents received their driver's license, 23 received an ID card, 26 received their Social Security card and 16 received birth certificates.

Reentry Officers:

In April, 117 facility residents were reported to be employed and 6 residents were reported to be ineligible for employment at this time. Reentry Officers reported 3 education referrals that resulted in an education enrollment. Reentry Officers conducted 212 reentry facility office visits, 122 Phase IV office visits, 42 Phase IV home visits, and 42 Pre-Parole Plan Verifications.

Transitional Housing:

There are a total of 22 licensed facilities with 410 ACC funded residents in the facilities.

Within the transitional facilities there are a total of 268 residents who have obtained full time employment, 18 part time employed, 28 receiving disability and 96 pending employment and/or left facility prior to obtaining employment.

This month, 3 residents reported to have enrolled in GED classes.

There are a total of 56 registered sex offenders living in

the transitional facilities.

A total of 29 residents received their driver's license, 84 received an ID card, 84 received their Social Security card and 51 received birth certificates.

A total of 49 residents graduated the transitional housing program, 37 absconded, and 20 were dismissed.

Employment:

During the month of April, there were 385 residents reported to have full-time employment within the reentry and transitional facilities.

Arkansas Works:

During the month there were approximately 265 individuals screened for the Arkansas Works program. A total 753 individuals who submitted application and 462 who enrolled in a "Qualified Health Plan" as reported by Eaton Agency.

Reentry Week 2021 - during which programming in the areas of employment, education, and other needed programs and services are highlighted - was a huge success across the state.

On Day 4 (Mental Health Day), a total of 24 met with representatives from American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and Hometown Behavioral Health. In Harrison, Officers Carla Johnson and Morgan Clemence participated at the Boone County Sheriff's Office. In Mountain View, Agents Jimmy Carter and Jana Pinkston and Area Manager Brian Zini participated at the Stone County Sheriff's Office. The Sheriff's Department reported a total of 133 lbs. of expired and/or unused medication was collected. The expired/unused drugs will be destroyed by the DEA and will not be on the streets. In Melbourne, Agent Josh Morehead even helped serve some hot dogs at the IZARD County drop off location. In Mountain Home, AAM Eva Frame, SAPL Annie Rector, Officer Jacob May, and Agent Nick Mayfield joined Lieutenant Brad Hurst of Baxter County Sheriff's Department at a drive through drop off location in the Orschlen's parking lot.

Caseloads are presented in distinct officer groupings:

Regular: These are officers carrying normal Probation and Parole caseloads.

Specialty Court: These officers supervise offenders in specialty courts. Note that these officers may also carry regular P&P offenders, and these offenders are reflected in the specialty court caseload/workload figures; however, separate caseload/workload ratios are calculated for the regular and specialty court portions of a specialty court officer's caseload, in addition to a combined, or mixed, ratio.

Specialized: These officers supervise strategically specialized caseloads consisting of offenders requiring heightened supervision protocols (intensive supervision) and parolees who have absconded supervision (Special Response Team).

Indirect: These are offenders for whom their sentence, circumstance, or current status is associated with a reduced supervision obligation for the officers they are assigned to. Generally, these include offenders in non-reporting status, those on suspended sentences (SIS), and interstate compact offenders. Offenders on annual supervision are also included in this group.

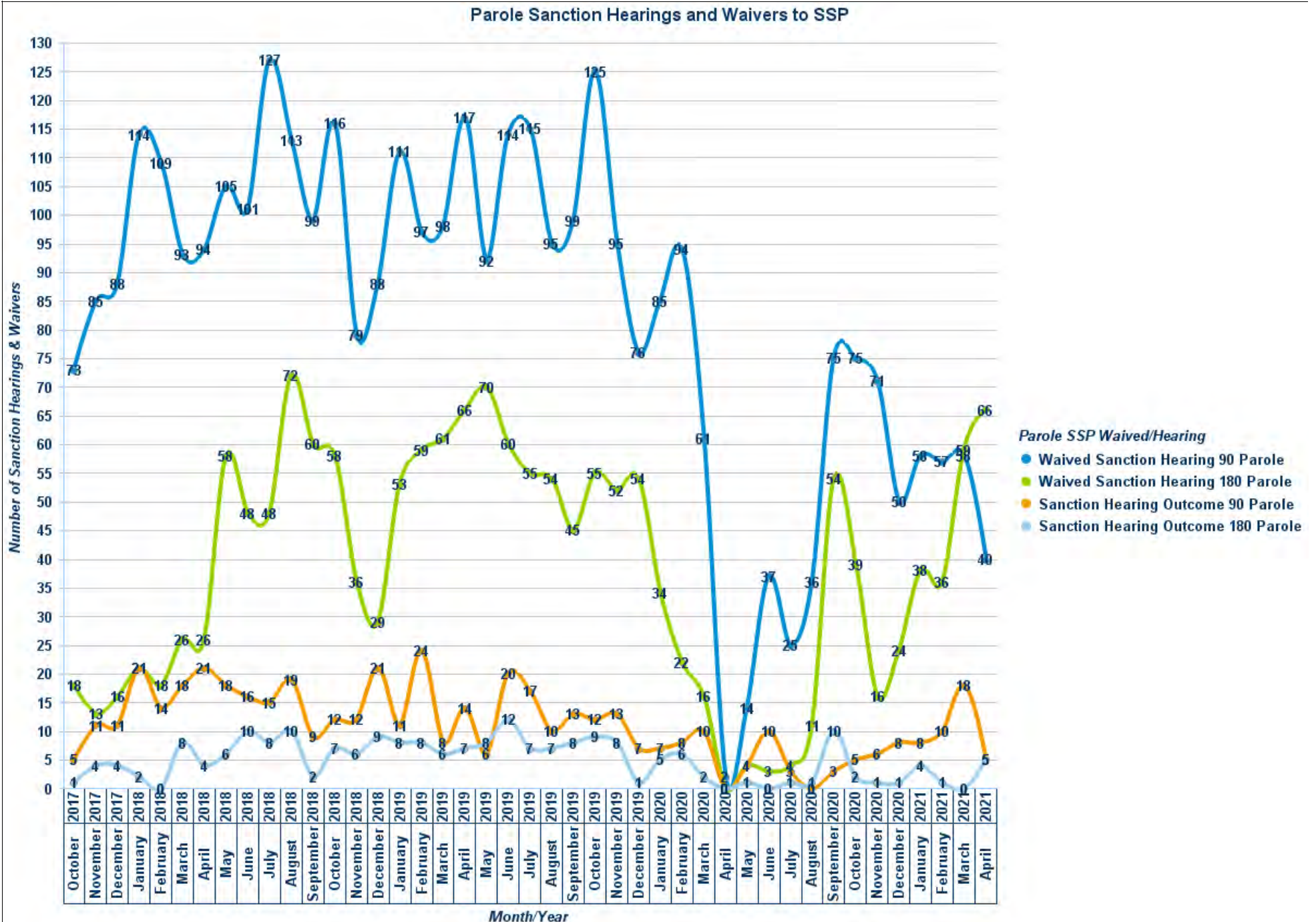
