Arkansas Correctional School District Career and Technical Education Curriculum Guide completed

Career Tech Instructors returned from summer break on July 13th

All CTE Programs implemented curriculum changes on July ${\bf 13}^{\rm th}$

Hours reduced from 1440 to 600

Curriculum changes developed using nationally recognized standards (NCCER & ServSafe)



Career and Technical Education

Beginning in mid-February and continuing through March, Deputy Superintendent Tracy Dowell researched and analyzed over five years of Riverside's data. Using eOMIS, each unit's program achievements were pulled and filtered. All of Riverside's program achievements were then assembled into one spreadsheet. Each Riverside completer had to be individually searched in eOMIS to determine TE date, returns to ADC, and employment status. After all the information was entered into the spreadsheet, the document was sorted in a number of ways. We were looking for trends in completions and employment, but we also needed to know which programs were most cost effective.

The analysis yielded several interesting findings such as: inconsistencies in program completions entered into eOMIS, gender and racial differences, and variations in curricula and competency profiles.

After reviewing other correctional CTE programs across the US, the decision was made to reduce the required hours for completion from 1440 to 600. Cosmetology is the exception because the State requires 1500 hours for licensure. Although the hour requirement s were more than halved, the modules covered remained mostly unchanged. Prior to July 1, Tracy Dowell wrote and standardized each course's curriculum. Now, courses taught at different units are using the same curriculum and covering the same material. This is important for several reasons. First, new instructors will know what skills they should be teaching. Second, supervisors can ensure instructors are covering the required material. Third, standardized curriculum legitimizes our program and keeps us accountable.



On March 2, 2021, Arkansas Correctional School, Riverside Vo-Tech, and ACS IT met with iCEV representatives at the Central Office for an iCEV demo. After a follow-up Zoom meeting, ADC IT configured and installed the new lab at ECACCC.

The pilot program began in early June with ACS teacher Jerri Woodson as facilitator.

Ten ladies completed the Personal Financial Literacy course and most elected to stay in the pilot and complete a second course.

Short programs

Basic Agricultural Mechanics and Keyboarding

Several supervisors and instructors have expressed their interest in starting these courses at their units. Both of these courses would be a good option for inmates with short time or low academic ability.

Barbering

In Arkansas, barbers and cosmetologist must complete 1500 hours. To receive a certificate of registration to practice as a barber, the person: (1) shall be qualified under the Arkansas Barber Law, §17-20-101 et seq.; (2) shall be of good moral character and temperate habits; (3) must pass a satisfactory examination conducted by the Board to determine his or her fitness to practice barbering (4) shall be at least sixteen and one-half (16 ½) years of age; and (5) must receive training approved by the appropriate licensing authorities.
