Parole/Probation Home Visits

On March 1, a home visit was conducted with two offenders by Area 2 Agent Jeffrey Baumgardner, Officer Bradley Duck, and the 14th Judicial District Drug Task Force. A black safe with a gray front cover with keypad and keyhole was found during the search. Upon questioning, it was learned that the safe belonged to a Parolee, who confirmed ownership and provided a key that opened the safe. Discovered inside the safe was a black backpack containing a large bag of green leafy substance consistent with marijuana and a plastic sack with a large quantity of white crystal-like substance consistent with methamphetamine. Also contained in the bag were multiple baggies for packaging, a cup with white residue, multiple envelopes with a large quantity of cash, and scales used for weighing. During interview, the Parolee admitted that he purchased the safe a few days prior and all of the illegal contraband inside belonged to him. He also stated that there was exactly \$5,000 in cash and even knew the specific denomination of the currency. The Parolee was arrested and transported to the Boone County Sheriff's Office with pending felony charges.

On March 24, **Area 2** Agents Lisa Wells and Jimmy Carter, with the assistance of the Searcy County Sheriff's Department, conducted a home visit of an offender in the town of Leslie. The visit resulted in the discovery of suspected methamphetamine, multiple items of drug paraphernalia and numerous firearms. Also discovered was DexiFlush, a known detox and flush pill substance used to adulterate drug tests. Upon further search of the residence, several items were located that were believed to be from a previous breaking and entering that occurred in Searcy County. All evidence was seized was taken to the Searcy County Sheriff's Department for processing.

On March 17, the Mississippi County Sheriff's Department received information that an offender was selling methamphetamine out of a vehicle owned by the City of Blytheville. Officers with the DTF, the Mississippi



County Street Crimes and the **Area 4** Parole/Probation Office subsequently conducted searches of the offender, his residence, and the city vehicle. The offender was found to have a quantity of hydrocodone pills on his person. Found in the vehicle was a 16-gauge sawed-off shotgun fitted with a pistol grip, as well as two baggies of methamphetamine, a meth pipe and a set of digital scales. At his residence, Officers found additional ammunition and drug paraphernalia.

On the afternoon of March 25, Jonesboro Police Officers Williams and Austin assisted **Area 4** Parole/Probation Agent Bryan Hook and Parole/Probation Officer Chad Mason in a search at the residence of an offender located at a local apartment complex.

A wide variety of narcotics were found during the search including .3 grams of oxycodone, 1.2 grams hydrocodone, 770 grams marijuana, 28 grams of cocaine, 13.5 grams of ecstacy, and a Taurus .357, a magazine for a .22 caliber Walther firearm, and .22 caliber ammunition.

On March 7, IPS Agents received information that an offender had been residing at the Super 7 Inn in Little Rock. **Area 8** Agents Ryan Gordon and Roderick McGruder conducted a search of the room, where the offenders belongings were located. A search of the offender's person was conducted, and officers located 115 grams of marijuana, 1.5 grams, of Xanax, and 1 hydrocodone. All evidence was collected by LRPD. The offender was transported to the LRPD Detective's Office, and while there, the offender tried to punch a detective. The offender was booked into the Pulaski County Jail on felony drug and battery charges.

During the month, **Area 11** Agents Brooke Williams and Dustin Parker, along with Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) Deputies Holcomb and Jones, conducted a home visit at the last known address of an offender in White Hall. Prior to conducting the home visit, Little Rock Police Department (LRPD) Detective Stubenrauch had been contacted regarding a list of items that had been stolen from their evidence hangar.

Upon arrival, the Agents knocked on the door and could hear movement coming from inside, along with dogs barking. A female voice said she had to put up her dogs, which took several moments. A white female then opened the door a crack, and when asked if the offender was home, she stated that he was at work, and he had left earlier that morning. She denied knowing where he was, stating he was working a day job and she never knows where he may be located. She identified herself as the homeowner and girlfriend of the offender. When asked to enter the residence in order to verify that the offender was not inside, she agreed and opened the door. While attempting to verify that the offender was not hiding inside the residence, numerous items were observed in plain sight in the common areas that matched the items on the list Det. Stubenrauch had provided. Photos were taken of the items and sent to him. He called back and advised that the items were positively identified as the items stolen from the LRPD evidence hangar.

At that time, Pine Bluff Police Department detectives were dispatched to take over the scene. While waiting for them to arrive, the offender's girlfriend admitted that he had been at the residence prior to the arrival of law enforcement, but when he saw the JCSO units arrive, he ran out the back door of the residence.

Residential Services

Captain Andre Harris of the Northeast Arkansas

Community Correction Center is leading by example. During March, a photo of him being measured for a cap and gown in anticipation of his May graduation was featured in a social media post by Arkansas Northeastern College (ANC) in Blytheville. He'll be graduating from ANC in May with an associate degree and plans to immediately begin work earning a bachelor's degree.



A career/college fair was hosted by Osceola High School at the school's Seminole Arena. Staff from the **Northeast Arkansas Community Correction Center** had the chance to meet and talk with many senior students – who will soon be entering the workforce – about opportunities with ACC.





To help with better serving their residents, the **Central Arkansas Community Correction Center** updated their computer lab at the facility during the month.

Vera Euvrad, Fiscal Support Analyst with the **East Central Arkansas Community Correction Center (ECACCC)**, went the extra mile when she became involved with the Sisters of Sewing program. She took up the skill of sewing in order to effectively oversee the residents as they work together to prepare about 300 masks per week to supply the ECACCC and all other ACC residential centers.



In March, **Omega Supervision Sanction Center** staff took part in an Emergency Preparedness Tabletop Training exercise.



Treatment Program Summary

1,436 probationers and parolees were served in the general Substance Use Disorder Treatment programs. Additionally, 1,401 participants were served in the Drug Court Treatment programs, bringing the total served to 2,837.

A total of 613 residents have agreed to participate in Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) since the program started in July 2018. A total of 309 were discharged with follow up in progress in the community and 84 have completed the program.

Partnerships are in effect with 71 community providers to continue MAT upon release from an ACC center and the program has been extended through September 2022. Transitional Housing Services and Peer Recovery Specialists have been added to the MAT program.

An Intensive Case Management pilot program in the North Little Rock Parole/Probation Office (Area 8) began in September 2021 and currently has four participants. A total of four referrals for services are in progress. One was assited with housing and mental health services.

Reentry Program

REENTRY FACILITIES

At the end of March, ACC had six licensed Reentry Facilities with 181 total residents in Phases I-IV of the Reentry Facility program. There were 25 Reentry graduates during March.

During the month, 32 new residents were transferred into the Reentry program, 11 residents started WAGE classes, six residents completed WAGE, and one resident started GED classes. A total of five residents started the Career Readiness Certificate program and 16 residents completed the program. A total of 14 Reentry Facility residents received their driver's license, 15 received an ID card, 22 received their Social Security card and 14 received birth certificates.

REENTRY OFFICERS

In March, 132 residents were reported to be employed. Reentry Officers reported four education referrals which resulted in education enrollment.

Reentry Officers conducted 116 Reentry Facility office visits, 115 Phase IV office visits, 18 Phase IV home visits, and 43 pre-parole plan verifications. Reentry Officers made 41 community contacts within their assigned area during the month and conducted 80 office visits in their area.

During March, 335 offenders were screened for the Arkansas Works program. There were 914 applications received and 678 who enrolled in a qualified health plan as reported by the Eaton Agency.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

There are 18 licensed vendor facilities with 418 ACC-funded beds within the facilities.

Within the transitional facilities, there are 311 residents who have obtained full-time employment.

This month, one resident reported to have enrolled in GED classes. There are 290 residents who reported to have received their GED or high school diploma.

During the month, there were 43 registered sex offenders living in a transitional facility.

A total of 47 residents received their driver's license, 137 received an ID card, 77 received their Social Security card and 79 received birth certificates.

A total of 68 residents graduated from the Transitional Housing program, 61 absconded and 22 were dismissed.

Specialty Court: These officers supervise offenders in specialty courts. Note that these officers may also carry regular P&P offenders, and these offenders are reflected in the specialty court caseload/workload figures; however, separate caseload/workload ratios are calculated for the regular and specialty court portions of a specialty court officer's caseload, in addition to a combined, or mixed, ratio.

Specialized: These officers supervise strategically specialized caseloads consisting of offenders requiring heightened supervision protocols (intensive supervision) and parolees who have absconded supervision (Special Response Team).

Indirect: These are offenders for whom their sentence, circumstance, or current status is associated with a reduced supervision obligation for the officers they are assigned to. Generally, these include offenders in non-reporting status, those on suspended sentences (SIS), and interstate compact offenders. Offenders on annual supervision are also included in this group.


