



Community Correction Centers Programming Options 2022 Criteria

Judges require eligible offenders (residents) to participate in the programs when offenders meet the criteria in the Board of Corrections’ Administrative Regulation entitled, “Community Correction Center Criteria and Standards.” A resident participates in one of four treatment programs guided by Modified Therapeutic Community treatment concepts. The treatment programs vary in length and, to an extent, the content and focus differs. However, the underlying treatment methods and documentation are similar in each program. The four treatment programs are:

- **Long Term Treatment Program**
- **Special Needs Program**
- **Short Term Drug Court Program**
- **Supervision Sanction Program**

Each Treatment Program has three basic phases that are progress driven. The normal length of stay will be from 6 to 12 months. Throughout the program, staff assess resident progress, readiness to integrate new information and behavior change. Early release eligibility is determined by program progress and compliant behaviors according to sentencing tracks as follows:

Judicial Transfer Long Term

- Track 1: 1- to 3-year sentence = 6 months early release eligibility
- Track 2: 4-year sentence = 8 months early release eligibility
- Track 3: 5-year sentence = 10 months early release eligibility
- Track 4: 6- year sentence = 12 months early release eligibility

Supervision Sanction Program (SSP)

- 120-Day SSP Parole = 60 days early release eligibility
- 180-Day SSP Probation = 90 days early release eligibility
- 60-Day SSP Parole = 30 days early release eligibility
- 90-Day SSP Probation = 45 days early release eligibility

Phase I is the Orientation phase, which provides education and familiarization with the therapeutic environment and structure. It introduces the Cognitive Intervention process, which helps residents identify and correct thinking errors.

Phase II is the main Treatment phase. The duration of treatment is based upon minimum sentence length required as well as resident’s progress. During this phase, individualized needs are addressed through compliance with master treatment plans, monthly individual counseling sessions, specific homework assignments, groups, education classes and the therapeutic community environment.

Phase III is the Relapse Prevention/Reentry phase. The focus is on creating a bridge from the present treatment environment to the outside community.

The **Short-Term Drug Court Program** is a program in which Specialized Court judges can place an offender in a Community Correction Center for a 30- to 90-day intensive residential treatment program. This program is mandated by the judge and not eligible for early release.
