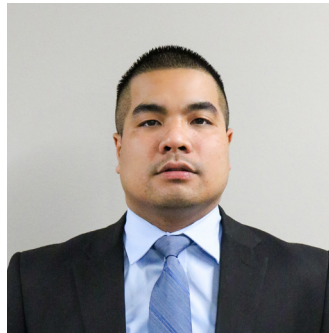
FROM THE DIRECTOR: PROMOTIONS

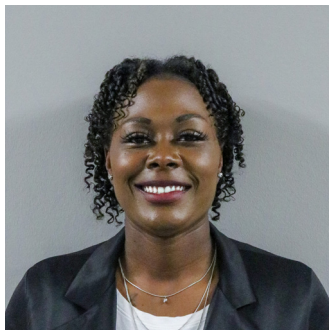

PAROLE/PROBATION AREA HIGHLIGHTS:

AREA 2

PAROLE/PROBATION HOME VISITS:

Area 3 ISP Officers received multiple anonymous tips on absconders throughout the month. During searches of the residences, a total of three absconders and other offenders were arrested with new felony drugs charges.

On February 8 in Area 8, ISP Agents received a reliable tip of an offender in possession of a firearm and illegal substances at his approved address. During the home visit, Agents discovered a cigarette pack with a leafy like substance and a white powdered substance, a scale and a backpack with multiple individual packaged bags of a white substance. The evidence was retained by the Little Rock Police Department and the offender was taken into custody with new felony charges pending.

Area 11 Agents accompanied by ISP Agents, conducted a home visit in the Pine Bluff area that resulted in the discovery of two offenders in possession of methamphetamines and loaded

syringes. The evidence was retained by Pine Bluff Vice and Narcotics with new charges pending.

Agents from Area 11 conducted a vehicle search of an offender who seemed distracted and jittery during an office visit. During the search, a glass methamphetamine pipe and a small clear plastic bag of a white crystal like substance was recovered. The evidence was retained by Pine Bluff Drug Task Force with new charges pending.

Food Supervisor Christine Walker was named the February Employee of the Month.

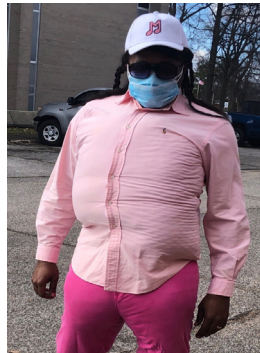

TREATMENT:

PROGRAM SUMMARY

1,608 probationers and parolees were served in the general Substance Use Disorder Treatment programs. Another 1,605 participants were served in the Drug Court Treatment programs, bringing the total served to 3,213 for the month.

A total of 772 residents have agreed to participate in Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) since the program started in July 2018. A total of 451 were discharged with follow up in the community in progress and 117 have completed the program.

Partnerships are in effect with 78 community providers to continue MAT upon release from an ACC center. Funds for the third cycle of the State Opioids Response (SOR) III grant from the Division of Aging Adult and Behavioral Health Services (DAABHS) were released, allowing for continuation of the program.

An Intensive Case Management pilot program in the North Little Rock Parole/Probation Office (Area 8) began in September 2021 and currently has one active participant. Activities in February included mental health service referrals in the community and basic needs.

In February, there were 18 active participants in the newly implemented Telehealth program.

AREA 1:

Recovery Community members from The Rink, a local meeting Center, assisted Benton County Treatment Court (BCTC) program participants with needs as part of their Bridge the Gap efforts. The members also in recovery provides general assistance to citizens in recovery.

BCTC program participants attended openhouse at Positive Energy Affecting Recovering Lives' (PEARL) transitional living program. Nine program participants also participated in their 5k New Client Running Group; two of them placed in their age group.

Parent and Children Together (PACT), a UAMS program, is working with program participants for counseling and family unification assistance. The program is in the process of rolling out Managing Youth Trauma Effectively (MYTE) for the Washington County Treatment Court. With grant funds, UAMS also presented four days of Motivational Interviewing training attended by drug court staff and other members of the community.

AREA 2:

Sharp County Treatment Court implementation training was held February 16 in Ash Flat.

A graduate of 14th Judicial District Treatment Court in Harrison began a special 5-week class on Addiction Cycle on February 14. Foci includes mind and body aspect of addiction, spirituality, and the 12 Steps of Alcoholics and Narcotic Anonymous.

AREA 3:

Graduates and current participants of the Independence County Treatment Court program manned a booth set up by the program at the Me Over Meth Conference held in Batesville. The booth was a showcase of Treatment Court, and provided pamphlets and schedule of support groups in the area to attendees.

Substance Abuse Program Leader teamed with representatives of Arkansas Department of Health and presented Narcan education/administration class to program participants in Clinton. The session was well received and free Narcan kit was given to participants.

Treatment Court Advisor and ACC Agent in Searcy facilitated a Treatment Court orientation training for two new team members from the Prosecutor's Office and local 100 Families. Both new members were excited and look forward to working with the team.

A Heber Springs Treatment Court participant died of medical issues on February 22. A local pastor on the

TREATMENT, AREA 3 continued:

treatment court team held a session with participants on March 1, and are being closely monitored.

Walnut Ridge Treatment Court Program participants continue voluntary participation in a monthly cooking class at a local Baptist Church. They learn to do grocery shopping, cook, get a free meal and community service hour as incentive.

AREA 4:

On February 10, Treatment Court Advisors met with Adult Education Director at ASU Trumann Campus for an update on participants' progress in GED/WAGE program, and to initial process of enrolling participants in the new Poinsett County Treatment Court.

A Registered Nurse from Department of Health was guest speaker in Joneboro's Substance Abuse Treatment Program. Topics addressed include WIC Program, birth control, mammogram, STD, and process for requesting birth certificate. In other separate events, a representative of Northeast Arkansas Center for Good Grief gave a presentation of free services the Center offers; and a representative of Life Strategies a non-profit organization spoke of free services that include assistance with utility and household items.

AREA 5:

On February 21, Polk County Treatment Court Program participants welcomed owner of Tidwell Logging who spoke on employment opportunities and answered questions on returning to the workforce after incarceration/legal issues. Topics addressed by other guest speakers include "Chunking vs Multi-Tasking" that clarifies "completion" of tasks presented by a Licensed Professional Counselor from local mental health services provider.

Substance Abuse Program Leader in Mena had a guest speaker share his testimony, and present a topic on "Learned Helplessness" respectively on February 6 and February 13.

AREA 6:

Faulkner County Treatment Court received positive feedback from an audit by the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Community outreach and networking events the Assistant Treatment Program Manager (ATPM) participated in included Lake DeGray retreat of the Board of Arkansas Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors, and the monthly meeting of Recovery Connections in North Little Rock. ATPM and Medication Assisted Treatment Program Coordinator also facilitated NARCAN Education session for Faulkner County Treatment Team.

ATPM advocated for Medication Assisted Treatment program participants with Blue Cross Blue Shield and regained Vivitrol coverage without additional cost to program participants.

A representative of InSync Mental Health Counseling gave a presentation on services they provide and referral process to the treatment team at their monthly clinical supervision meeting.

Faulkner County Treatment Court's partnership with RISE House a local Provider to give multiple presentations to program participants on Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence in 2023 is in progress.

AREA 7:

Representatives of UAMS presented "AIDS, HIV, and Other STD" to Treatment Court Program participants in Lonoke.

AREA 9:

Substance Abuse Program Leader serving Helena met with Rural Health Development a local organization to network assistance for program participants.

AREA 10:

Treatment Court Program in Camden held a month of amnesty to encourage absconders' return to the program. Five participants were reinstated and amnesty period was extended. The Camden program and Monticello program also started Clothes Closets to assist participants as needed.

AREA 11:

Treatment staff in the Treatment Court Program in El-Dorado met with HUB and SHARE Foundation representatives in effort to develop a partnership that focus on including criminal justice population in their financial assistance and training to improve poverty programs.

TREATMENT continued:

ONGOING PROJECTS:

A survey conducted on “Living in Balance” shows majority of program participants and staff favor the new curriculum. Arkansas Correctional Industries is working on printed copies of the workbooks.

Two six-hour in-person trainings on “Pharmacology and the Brain” as part of continuing education and credentialing requirement in NLR and Pine Bluff. A combined total of 67 participants attended. Treatment Services Assistant Director also facilitated Cognitive Behavioral Education training for selected staff from NLR Office. Additional training sponsored by other agencies include NADCP Regional Treatment Provider training; Me Over Meth Conference; CPR, and Tobacco Cessation Training, all attended by various staff.

Treatment supervisors reported combined 238 hours of direct clinical supervision with Treatment staff in 34 ACC locations.

REENTRY PROGRAM:

REENTRY FACILITIES:

As of February 28, ACC had six licensed Reentry Facilities with 174 total residents in Phases I-IV of the Reentry program. Since the program began, a total of 2,821 individuals have successfully completed and graduated from the program. There was a total of 24 reentry graduates during the month.

During the month, 47 new residents were transferred into the Reentry program, 18 residents started the Career Readiness Certificate program and 22 residents completed the program. A total of 26 Reentry Facility residents received their driver’s license, 25 received an ID card, 16 received their Social Security card and 17 received birth certificates.

REENTRY OFFICERS:

In February, 129 Reentry residents were reported to be employed and 33 residents were reported to be ineligible for employment at this time. Reentry Officers reported two education referrals, which resulted in **two** enrollments.

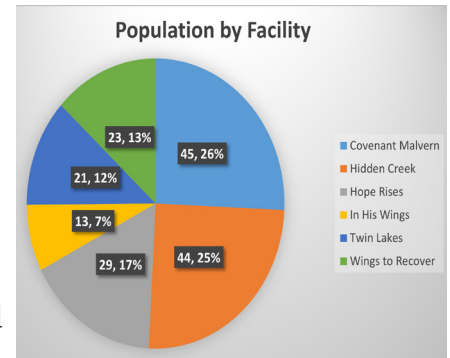
Reentry Officers conducted 166 reentry facility office visits, 115 Phase IV office visits, 23 Phase IV home visits and 55 pre-parole plan verifications. Reentry Officers made 32 community contacts within their assigned area during the month and conducted 74 office visits in their area.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING:

There are 20 licensed vendor facilities with 593 beds (183 ACC-funded) in the facilities.

Within the transitional facilities, there are 83 residents who have obtained full-time employment.

In February, one resident reported to have enrolled in GED classes and there are 102 Transitional Housing facility residents who previously received their GED or high school diploma.



During the month, there were 19 registered sex offenders living in transitional facilities.

A total of 13 residents received their driver’s license, 90 received an ID card, 81 received their Social Security card and 14 received birth certificates.

A total of 54 residents graduated from the Transitional Housing program, 39 absconded and 9 were dismissed.

Generally, these include offenders in non-reporting status, those on suspended sentences (SIS), and interstate compact offenders. Offenders on annual supervision are also included in this group.

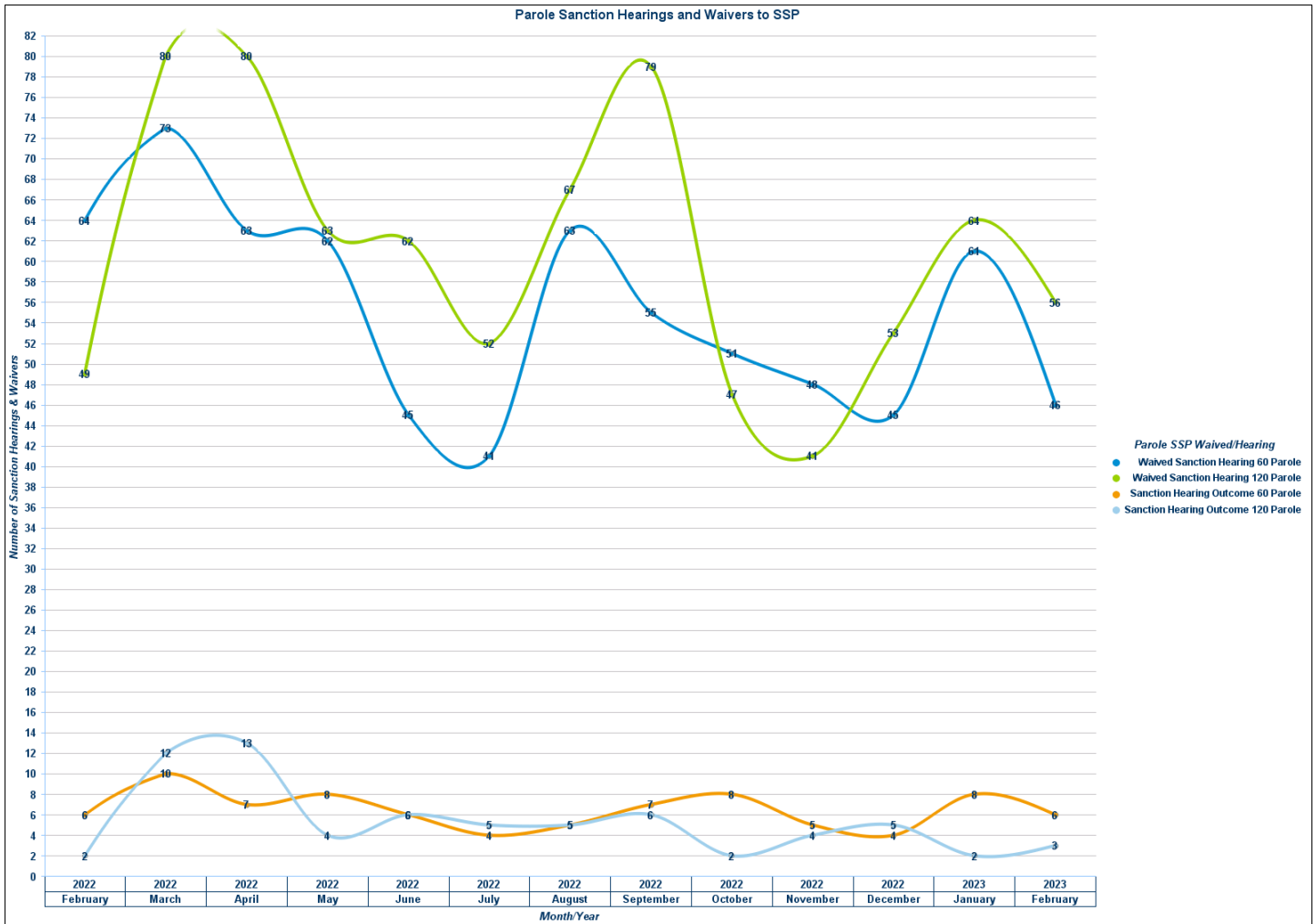
