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Impact Assessment for HB1503 Sponsored by Representative Gazaway

Subtitle TO CREATE THE OFFENSE OF OPERATING A CHOP SHOP; TO CREATE THE OFFENSE OF DEALING IN STOLEN OR FORGED MOTOR VEHICLE PARTS; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Impact Summary¹ Cannot be determined.

Change from Current Law² Under the proposed bill, a person commits the offense of § 5-36-109, Operating a chop shop, a Class C felony if he or she knowingly: (1) Owns, operates, or conducts a chop shop; (2) Transports a motor vehicle or motor vehicle part to or from a chop shop; (3) Sells, transfers, purchases, or receives a motor vehicle part ether to or from a chop shop; or (4) Modifies or removes a vehicle identification number with the purpose of misrepresenting the identity or preventing the identification of a motor vehicle or motor vehicle part. A person commits dealing in stolen or forged motor vehicle parts, a Class D felony if he or she knowingly sells, transfers, purchases, possesses, or receives a motor vehicle or motor vehicle part with a modified vehicle identification number.

Impact Information Because the proposed bill creates a new offense, data is unavailable as to the likely number of convictions for the new offense. Some conduct under the proposed bill is potentially already criminalized under existing criminal provisions for which the penalty may vary. For this reason, the projected impact of the proposed bill cannot be determined.
