

THZ Arkansas Department of Corrections is pleased to inform you that the annual Horse Auction will be hosted on March 8th, 2025 at 1:00pm at the Saline County Fairgrounds in Benton, Arkansas. During this event, the public will have the opportunity to bid on the 24 horses that are retiring from service as partners to the correctional officers and livestock men and women employed by the ADC.

FOLKS interested in participating in bidding on the animals are invited to view and ride them from 10am to 6pm on March 7th, 2025.

PLEASE keep in mind that the horses will not be ridden on sale day. They will only be viewed.

- All riders wanting to try horses must sign a liability release waiver prior to the ADC allowing them to mount a horse on preview day.
- The ADC will furnish all saddles and tack on preview day. Personal saddles/bridles will not be allowed.

We would like to give a big THANK YOU to all of our ADC employees and volunteers whose hard work makes this event possible. And a special thanks to all of our auction participants that bring our vision of Good Homes to Good Horses a reality!



THE ADC HORSE PROGRAM

THE heart of the ADC's horse program is located at our North Central Unit, situated just north of the town of Calico Rock. The unit boasts 540 acres that is home to the Agricultural Division's horse breeding and training program, hay meadows, and garden.

THERE are currently 34 brood mares that are bred annually based on factors such as conformation, disposition, and size, to ensure the safest mounts possible for our officers to monitor inmate squads.



TRAINING of the colts that are produced by these mares is handled by inmate workers under the careful guidance and supervision of ADC Farm employees, and

begins when they turn 2 years old. This allows inmates to learn skills that they can take with them when they rejoin society as rehabilitated citizens.

W2 raise our horses to meet a variety of needs within the Department of Corrections. At the age of four, they are sent to their units of assignments where they may be exposed to jobs such as:

- Security for work crews.
- Working cattle at one of the ADC's cow/calf operations.
- Serving as mounts for searches with tracking dogs.
- Regional maintenance crews.

ALL horses are well cared for and receive regular veterinary and farrier visits throughout their time with us. It is through the hard work of our employees and inmate crews that they receive the best care possible. We know as stewards of these animals that we could not do our jobs as effectively without our equine partners. It is in that spirit that we find this year's group of retirees good homes to live out the rest of their lives with love and honor.

Arkansas Department of Corrections Division of Agriculture

THZ Agriculture Division is a system-wide program that benefits the DOC in more than just providing solid horses. Our work strives to provide food for inmate consumption, which results in reducing the cost of incarceration for tax payers. We provide outlets for inmates to get outside and work, with a goal of reducing institutional violence, and provide useful and meaningful work for inmates by instilling work ethic, which is essential for success in re-entry.

THE ADC's beef herd runs nearly 1300 head of cattle. Here we produce prime beef which is sold, and the proceeds used to purchase lesser grades of beef for inmate consumption.





OUR Dairy proudly cares for about 160 head of dairy cattle. These lovely ladies provide raw milk that is sent to our processing plant to be turned into a reduced fat milk that goes out to the units.

ROW CROP and Hot House departments provide fresh fruits and vegetables for inmates, as well as feed for the livestock in our care. They also allow us to provide self-funding for the farm!





2998 are produced in our poultry houses located at the Cummins Farm. These eggs are sent out to various DOC facilities for inmate consumption. Manure from the chickens is used to enrich the soil in our gardens and fields.







AUCTION RULES

IT is of utmost importance to us at the ADC to maintain an above and beyond satisfactory relationship with the buyers of our horses. We do this by presenting each and every animal with the HONZOTY and INTEGRITY we cherish and pride ourselves on as members of the Agricultural Division.

- Only ADC staff are allowed to enter horse stalls
- For safety, once the auction begins, all of the viewing public will need to be seated in the auction area.
- The ADC is not held liable for injuries or damages that may occur from a horse.
- The ADC reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
 Persons bidding on the animals must have a valid identification.
- If there is a disagreement with the auctioneer, the bid will start over at the last bid taken.
- Once you have won the bid on a horse, you must pay for that horse. No trading before they are paid for.
- There will be a brief intermission at the end of the auction to get paperwork in order. At that time, we will begin taking payments.
- We will accept personal checks, cash, money orders, or certified checks.
- Animals must be paid for in full before loading, unless arrangements have been made.
- All animals will be loaded out the day of the auction.
- ADC employees will load out animals.
- Coggins certification papers will be available for each animal.
- If you are moving your animal out of state, Dr. Nixon will be available for health papers.
- Once the animal is loaded on a trailer for transport, it becomes the property of the buyer.



He's always been very gentle with everyone but especially Margaret. Margaret was diagnosed a couple of years ago with progressive cognitive dementia. Forrest has really helped her to keep sharp. Margaret will walk Forrest around the pasture and she brushes him. He loves to have his back rubbed up close to his mane.




