

#### ACT 279

"AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF SCHOOLS AT THE VARIOUS UNITS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES !

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

SECTION 1. Proparties owned by the State of Arkansas and occupied by the various units of the Department of Correction are by this Act designated as a school district to be known as the Department of Correction School District, and the State Board of Correction shall act as the school board for such

13 SECTION 2. This district is created for the purpose of providing
14 elementary, secondary, and vocational technical education to all persons in15 carcerated in the Department of Correction facilities who are not high school
16 graduates, irrespective of age; provided that notwithstanding the other pro17 visions of this Act, the adult education programs which are administered by
18 the England Special School District No. 2 on the effective date of this Act
19 shall continue to be administered by such England Special School District,
21 and all federal and state funds received by the England Special School District
22 Mo. 2 for such programs shall be applied against federal and state funds avail23 able to the Department of Correction School District under this Act.

SECTION 3. The cost of implementing and operating the school program in the district authorized by this Act shall be borne by the State and shall be paid from funds appropriated by the General Assembly from the General Revenues of the State to the Department of Correction and the Department of Education, together with any federal funds that may be available for such purpose, in the following manner:

(a) The cost of facilities, equipment, and current operation in excess of the amount of grants and aids received from the Department of Education shall be borne by the Department of Correction.

(b) This district, as other school districts of the State, shall share
In the distribution of grants and aids from the Department of Education. In
On case, however, shall the distribution of Minimum Foundation Program hid
Punds to this district be in excess of the average current expenditure per
pupil by all the school districts of the state for the previous year; nor
shall other grants and aids be in excess of the average distributed, per
pupil or per program, to the districts of the state in the previous year.

9 SECTION 4. The State Board of Correction and the State Board of Edu-10 cation are hereby directed, authorized and empowered to adopt such rules and 11 regulations as are necessary to implement the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 5. The schools established under the provisions of this Act and
those persons incarcerated who attend such schools shall be entitled to all
those persons incarcerated who attend such schools shall be entitled to all
of the privileges provided generally to common public schools and/or adult
deducation programs administered by the State Board of Education to students
who attend the same under the laws of the State of Arkansas; provided such
privileges do not conflict with the rules, regulation and policies of the
pepartment of Correction or the laws of the State respecting the establishment and operation of the Department of Correction.

SECTION 6. The State Board of Correction and the State Board of Education may accept gifts, grants, donations, equipment, materials, bequests and real and personal property from public and private sources to implement and operate the school program authorized by this Act.

SECTION 7. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are

SECTION 8. If any part of this Act, or its application, shall become or be held invalid, the remainder hereof shall nevertheless be and remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 9. The General Assembly finds that there is an immediate need for the institution of basic education for immates of the Department of Correction, to the end that the said immates may improve their minds and 1 characters and become less likely to commit further crimes. An emergency is 2 therefore declared to exist, and this Act, being necessary for the public 3 health, safety, and welfare, shall be effective from and after its passage 4 and approval.
